## Headteacher's Update

## Dear Parents/Carers

I can't believe we're coming to the end of another term! Despite it being a short term, we have managed to fit a lot of learning and fun into the term. We have had quite a lot of parent visits and curriculum events – thank you for supporting them. May I also thank you for your patience and understanding during the recent bad weather. Hopefully, with the official start of Spring earlier this week, we will see some better weather.

## **Learning Journey - Curriculum**

Soon after I started at Harpur Hill, we reviewed the Learning Journey and made the topics more cross curricular, as well as including more opportunities to learn about local history and make better use of opportunities that we have in Buxton and the wider Peak District. We have also tried to include global events and news in the curriculum, such as the EU Referendum, Tim Peake's space mission and the US Presidential Election. We now take the children out on more educational visits and have more visitors into school to bring the learning to life. We start every new topic with a big question and ask the children what they would like to learn so they have some responsibility in shaping their learning. We now inform parents/carers of the topics at the end of the previous term and we send home the Learning Journey and post it on our website. The next step for our curriculum is to review the topics again for the next academic year in consultation with children.

#### Skills for Life Awards

Last year we introduced Learning for Life Awards linked with our school motto. In our assemblies and Collective Worship, we have weekly themes including values and skills that children need for life. We have a termly assembly where children receive a special Headteacher's Learning for Life Award and we invite parents/carers along so you can celebrate your child's success. We have received some very positive feedback about these assemblies and the awards.

Just over a year ago, we surveyed parents and made some changes as a result of the findings. We would now like to check you are happy with the changes we have made, and gather your views to shape our future work.

## **Nursery Survey**

Thank you to those parents who completed the Nursery survey. The results were very positive. The main findings are summarised below:

- Parents/carers access different numbers of Nursery hours from one or two afternoons to the full 30 hours
- Parents/carers would like to continue to access this flexible provision to suit their varying needs
- Many parents commented positively about the room and resources.
- An increasing number of parents are accessing the full 30 hours and some wish to do so in the future
- Many parents commented that it is convenient to have Nursery provision on the same site as the school.
- Many parents were complimentary about the friendly and caring staff.
- A few parents asked about transition to school and this is something we will be working on in the Summer Term to prepare those children who are starting school in September.

It is pleasing to have such good feedback after being open for just over 6 months.

# LEARNING JOURNEY TOPICS FOR NEXT TERM:

Nursery	Dinosaurs and the Jungle		
Reception	Our Topic next half term is all about <b>Castles</b> . We will be learning about why castles were built and who lived in them. We will be using lots of story books including George, the Dragon, the Princess and the Wizard by Julia Donaldson to inspire our writing. Towards the end of the term we will visit Pevril Castle and write our own non-fiction information text.		
Year 1	What are robots used for and how have toys changed? Children will be exploring robots, making robots and writing robot poems. We will continue to enjoy this topic for a few more weeks (we will update you after Easter about the next Topic: How do we use transport?). They will also look forward to a trip to 'Sudbury Hall and The National Trust Museum of Childhood' on Monday 14th May. Don't forget we would like to welcome you in for our Robot Making session on Tuesday 10th April at 2.30pm!		
Year 2	How has communication changed over time?  We will study William Caxton, Morse Code, Alexander Graham Bell and Sir Tim  Berners Lee. Texts will be The Hackney Martian by Paul Brown; Stories by the same author - Anthony Browne; How Things Work Lift the Flap book by Conrad Mason		
Year 3	What was it like to be a child in Victorian Buxton? We will be reading: Chimney Child by Laurie Sheehan The Walrus and the Carpenter by Lewis Carroll		
Year 4	Why are Norman castles certainly not bouncy?		
Year 5/6	Were the Vikings always victorious and vicious? We will be reading Viking Boy by Tony Bradman and writing activities along with some outdoor adventures!		

#### **Attendance**

We believe that regular school attendance is the key to enabling children to maximise the educational opportunities available and achieve greater success in life. Thank you to those of you who send your child to school every day and on time. Currently, our whole school attendance level is just below the national average. We understand that some absence may be due to seasonal illness and therefore, hope our attendance will rise in the months ahead. May we take this opportunity to remind you of government policy regarding attendance. Leave of absence may not be granted for holidays during term time unless there are 'exceptional circumstances'. These cases will be considered individually, taking attendance levels and reasons into account. We are unable to approve requests for leave of absence for reasons that are not considered to be special or exceptional such as:

- Availability of cheap holidays
- Cheap travel arrangements
- Days overlapping with beginning or end of term

This is government policy and parents/carers who take their children on holiday without permission will incur unauthorised absence for their child. Parents/carers could be issued with a fixed penalty notice and/or court action. Thank you for your support and co-operation.

# ADMINISTRATION

#### **Contact Information**

If you change your details (telephone, email, address etc.) please let school know as soon as possible, so we can update your child's records.

#### **Dinner Money**

Kindly note all dinner money should be paid to school on the Monday for the week ahead. If we do not receive a payment on the Monday that covers the rest of the week, we will contact you to remind you of your outstanding payment. If we do not receive payment by the end of the week we will request that your child brings a packed lunch until the amount outstanding is received, this is in accordance with our school policy.

If you would like to pay for the whole term 9.4.2018 – 25 5 2018 it will be £70.00.

We have had a few reports of head lice, please check your child's/ren's hair regularly and treat accordingly if you find any lice.

# **Midday Supervisors**

If you would like to become a relief midday supervisor, please let our staff in the school office know.

#### **Administration of Medicines**

We would like to remind you of the following, Parents/carers should come into school to discuss any concerns or issues they have regarding the administration of medicine. We will work together to ensure that children with medical needs are not disadvantaged.

- 1. We do not allow children to bring medication into school except as covered by the Local Authority guidelines and the relevant codes of practice.
- 2. We do not keep any medication for distribution to children, e.g. paracetamol. We do, of course, have first aid kits.

The responsibility for ensuring that children with medication needs receive the correct "treatment" rests ultimately with their parents/carers, or with a young person capable of self-administering his or her own medication (asthma inhalers). Parents and doctors should decide how best to meet each child's requirements. Carefully designed prescribing can sometimes reduce the need for medicine to be taken during school hours or to help avoid unnecessary taking of medicines at school, parents should:

- 1. Be aware that a three times daily dosage can usually be spaced evenly throughout the day and taken in the morning, after school hours and at bedtime;
- 2. Ask the prescriber if it is possible to adjust the medication to enable it to be taken outside the school day.

Where this cannot be arranged, parents/guardians should come to school to administer the medicine. If you have any queries, please contact the school office.
